Interesting Ohio History

The village of Bluffton, OH was founded in 1831 by Swiss Mennonites, German Reformists and Irish Catholics. It was originally named 'Crogan's Corners' after the postmaster. When the citizens chose to incorporate as a village, the Irish suggested the name 'Shannon' because of the green fields around the area. As there was already a village named Shannon in the state, the town was renamed Bluffton for the hilly terrain of the town site. Bank robber John Dillinger robbed the Bluffton Bank (now known as Citizens National Bank of Bluffton) of \$6,000 on August 14, 1933

- New Wildcard Series: MCPA introduced a new series this season, featuring artists from a diverse array of countries and genres, providing audiences the chance to experience different cultures.
- Expanded Education Programming: Talented students from grades three through twelve dazzle in Youtheatre productions that captivate the community and inspire young performers. The SPARK series of school day matinees bring thousands of students into the theater, sparking their imagination and fostering a love for the performing arts. Expanded workshop opportunities in both performing and visual arts draw participants from around the region.
- Community-Centered Events: Boogie, MCPA's beloved annual street party, returned bigger and better in June, drawing recordbreaking crowds and showcasing the vibrancy of Findlay's arts scene. Free concerts in the park every summer engage intergenerational audiences.

Reflecting on the year, Heather Clow, MCPA's Executive Director, shared her gratitude: "The arts bring us together in ways that are profoundly meaningful. It's heartwarming to see our spaces filled with laughter, music, and applause." She also acknowledged the critical role of donors and sponsors: "We owe so much to our supporters, especially Ohio Logistics, whose unwavering commitment has been the backbone of our success."

Be Healthy February is American Heart Month



Since 1963, February has been designated American Heart Month, a time to focus on the importance of our own cardiovascular health and the heart health of those we love. It's important because heart disease is the leading cause of death for men, women, and people of most racial and ethnic groups. One person dies every 33 seconds from cardiovascular disease. Here are things you can do to protect both your own heart health and that of your loved ones, not just in February, but throughout the year.

- Learn the steps to lower the risk of heart disease. The American Heart Association recommends key measures to help lower the risk for heart disease, stroke, and other major health problems which they call *Life's Essential 8*: Eat better, Be more active; Quit tobacco; Get healthy sleep; Manage weight; Control cholesterol; Manage blood sugar; Manage blood pressure.
- Know your blood pressure. Check it regularly at home, at the doctor's office or at the pharmacy. If it's high, make it a priority to take steps to control it.
- Familiarize yourself with heart attack and stroke symptoms, and learn what to do if you or someone around you appears to be experiencing cardio-vascular trouble. When properly and promptly performed, CPR can greatly improve a person's chance of survival should they experience cardiac arrest.

Did You Know?

Ierry Siegel and Ioe Shuster, two teenagers from Cleveland, Ohio, forever changed popular culture when they created Superman, the world's first superhero. In 1933, Siegel, a writer, and Shuster, an artist, envisioned Superman as a larger-than-life character with extraordinary powers who could champion justice. Inspired by science fiction, pulp magazines, and the struggles of the Great Depression, they crafted a story about an alien orphan named Kal-El who was sent to Earth and became Clark Kent, a mild-mannered reporter with a secret heroic identity.

Initially rejected by publishers, Superman found a home in Action Comics #1 in 1938, published by Detective Comics (later DC Comics). The character's bold costume, superhuman abilities, and unvielding morality resonated with readers, launching the superhero genre. Though Siegel and Shuster faced challenges in retaining rights to their creation, their work laid the foundation for modern comic books and inspired countless creators and fans worldwide.

Welcome to "Tech Talk," your inside source for all things IT. This month I want to provide some simple tech tips that could make a huge difference in your daily productivity. Start by ensuring your passwords are secure and unique for each account—using a password manager can help you stay organized while maintaining security. Embrace shortcuts, such as keyboard commands, to save time on repetitive tasks; for example, Ctrl+C and Ctrl+V for copying and pasting or Ctrl+Z to undo an action. Organizing your files with clear naming conventions and folder structures can also save time when retrieving important documents. For emails,

try using filters and labels to prioritize your inbox and reduce clutter. It's also helpful to learn basic troubleshooting techniques. Restarting a device or checking your internet connection can often resolve minor issues without needing IT support.
