Remembering Valor

The Legacy of an Ohio World War II Veteran



In the small town of Springfield, Ohio, Memorial Day holds a special significance. It's a day when the community comes together to honor the brave souls who sacrificed everything for their country. Interesting Ohio History

Wauseon, OH was platted in 1853 when the Michigan Southern Air Railway was extended to that point. Land speculators bought 160 acres of land, which would become the City of Wauseon. The original name for the city was "Litchfield" after Litchfield, New York, however, Hortensia Hayes, the daughter of an early settler, suggested that the new village be named after an Ottawa Tribe Chief named Wauseon, who was forced by the federal government to forfeit their land, before moving to Oklahoma in 1839. The village was incorporated in 1859, and in 1869 became the county seat.

Take Good Care Of Yourself



Trails, exercise parks, sports fields and stairs provide endless opportunities to switch up your workout. However, working out in hot and humid weather can put extra stress on your body, so consider the following tips to safely exercise outdoors:

- Avoid the hottest part of the day. If possible, plan your workout before 10 a.m. or after 3 p.m. to dodge strong sun rays.
- Wear light-colored clothing. Dark colors absorb the heat, while light colors reflect the sun. Lightweight, loose-fitting clothing will help air circulate and keep you cool.
- Apply sunscreen. Choose a broad-spectrum sunscreen that's at least 30 SPF. Reapply every two hours, even if the label says it's sweatproof. Wearing a wide-brimmed hat can also protect your face from the sun.
- Stay hydrated with water. Drink water before you head out and try to take sips every 15 minutes during your workout—whether you're thirsty or not.
- Replenish your electrolytes. Instead of reaching for a sports drink after a workout, consider replacing your electrolytes with foods like chia seeds, kale, coconut, or fruits and vegetables.
- Listen to your body. If you're feeling dizzy, faint or nauseous, stop exercising immediately. Sit in the shade and drink water until you're feeling better.

A good practice is for companies to have SOWs in place with their trading partners especially for all top suppliers. b) In projection management, the first project planning document that should be prepared. It describes the purpose, history, deliverables, and measurable success indicators for a project. It captures the support required from the customer and identifies contingency plans for events that could throw the project off course. Because the project must be sold to management, staff, and review groups, the statement of work should be a persuasive document.

Welcome to "Tech Talk," your inside source for all things IT. Fiber optic and copper internet represent two distinct technologies for transmitting data, each with its own advantages and limitations. Fiber optic internet employs thin strands of glass or plastic fibers to transmit data using light pulses. This method allows for significantly higher data transmission speeds over longer distances compared to traditional copper wiring. Additionally, fiber optic cables are immune to electromagnetic interference, ensuring more reliable and consistent connections. On the other hand, copper internet, which relies on electrical signals transmitted through copper wires, has been the traditional choice for decades. While copper cables are less

expensive to install and maintain, they are susceptible to signal degradation over long distances and are limited in bandwidth capacity. Consequently, fiber optic internet is preferred for applications requiring high-speed, high-bandwidth data transmission, whereas copper internet may suffice for basic residential internet needs.

Did you know: A single strand of standard single-mode fiber optic cable, can theoretically transmit data at speeds exceeding 100 terabits per second (Tbps).

Fact: It's estimated there are over 745,000 miles of fiber optic cable lying on the ocean floor.
